Knights Caps and Shirts

There has been some interest from our council members about acquiring a Knights of Columbus cap and/or shirt. After checking with several suppliers, I have the following information.

Caps will be made of washed chino twill fabric with white cording along the front of the visor. They will have the Knights of Columbus emblem with St. Thomas More Council 14270 embroidered on the front.

Shirts are made of seven-ounce 100% cotton with a welt collar and cuffs. The Knights of Columbus emblem will be embroidered on the left chest side and the member's first name will be embroidered on the right chest side.

The supplier has given us a great price. Caps can be purchased for \$12 each, provided the council orders at least 48 caps. If less than 48 caps are ordered, the price will be higher. One size fits all.

Shirts can be purchased for \$18 each, and there is no minimum order to get that price. Please specify size when ordering.

Culture of Life Fund

Last August, the delegates to the Annual Supreme Council Meeting reaffirmed the Order's longstanding commitment to the Church's teaching on life and marriage by unanimously approving Resolution 302, which established the Culture of Life Fund and a special assessment of \$3.00 per member. It was anticipated that this Fund would support a broad range of initiatives that advance the Culture of Life. I am happy to report that the Fund has done just that. Two programs, one to assist men and women to cope with the traumatic aftereffects of abortion and divorce and one to help men be better fathers have been introduced. To date, the response to these initiatives has far surpassed our expectations.

In addition, our financial support last fall was vital to the passage of constitutional amendments protecting the sanctity of marriage in California, Florida and Arizona. Today, 30 states have such amendments. In January, we implemented our new initiative helping state councils provide pregnancy centers with ultrasound machines. The Supreme Council partnered with local Knights to put this life-saving technology in the hands of pregnancy centers in both Iowa and Florida. On a national level, the Board of Directors recently voted to provide financial support to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops for a newly formed Task Force whose purpose is to promote the Church's teaching on marriage as the union of one man and one woman.

The Knights of Columbus has always been deeply committed to promoting racial equality and defending religious liberty as a basic civil right. In the United States today, the abortion lobby has indicated a desire to move the so-called "Freedom of Choice Act" (FOCA) through Congress. This radical piece of legislation would not only expand abortion "rights," but also force medical personnel morally opposed to abortion to violate their consciences and participate in abortions. In Canada, the Parliament has witnessed the introduction of a private member's bill that would legalize euthanasia across the country. On these and a host of other issues affecting the Culture of Life, the Knights of Columbus must be ready to educate the public about the need to support policies and legislations that protect human life from conception to natural death.

Please remember that contributions to the Fund from councils or individual members remain in the country of origin and will only be used for projects in that country.

The Responsibility of the Catholic Citizen in a Free Society

As Catholics, it is our responsibility to be a positive force in the world. We are called upon by God to use our resources responsibly and wisely. Mother Teresa quoted, "We can do no great things; only small things with great love." One act of random kindness is the first step to changing the world.

One way to be a positive force in the world is by donating your time, money and talent to charity and those less fortunate. Giving of yourself helps build stronger communities. Donating brings us closer to God and makes us more thankful and appreciative for what we have. Statistics show when we help others it makes us happier people. Donating grows our faith, mind, spirit and heart. When we contribute our time, money and talent, it sets a good example for others and motivates them to help, also.

As Catholics, it is also our responsibility to reduce, reuse and recycle energy and materials. We should start focusing on different alternative energies such as solar, wind, water and thermal energy. We also need to reduce our dependency on fossil fuels because we will eventually run out. There are many ways individuals can help reduce energy and materials. Turning down the thermostat a notch, carpooling and using the most environment friendly vehicle available are just a few ways to reduce energy use. Even simple things like turning off lights, using florescent light bulbs and unplugging appliances while not in use don't require much work. Reducing our consumption leaves us with more time for family, friends and community. We do not have to worry about working more hours to purchase more material belongings we probably don't need. Less pollution means less asthma, which has doubled since 1980 from 3.2 million to 6.5 million. Landfills are overflowing and we're running out of places to put all the trash. Americans throw away on average 200 million tons of trash each year. A way to make a difference is to donate our clothes to charities, thrift stores, and the less fortunate or pass them down as hand-me-downs. Approximately 242 million tires are thrown away each year and about 78% is sent to landfills. We could reduce this number by shredding them up and using tires instead of mulch, saving trees.

One final way to be a positive force in the world is to give a voice that life is sacred for those who can't voice it themselves. This would include speaking out against abortion, euthanasia, and fetal stem cell research. For instance on 9/11, approximately 3,000 + people were murdered. On any given day there are approximately 3,700 abortions performed. I believe the victims of 9/11 are no more important than the 3,700 babies aborted each day. Giving a voice is as easy as picketing an abortion clinic, volunteering at a nursing home or voting against embryonic stem cell research.

We need to make a positive force in the world, but how can we do this? Turn off water, computer, television and lights when not in use. Protest against abortion, euthanasia and stem cell and celebrate all forms of life. Donate old clothes, shoes and winter wear to charities. There are many simple ways to be a follower of Christ and all we have to do is act. If not you, who?
